## DIPLOMAS OF THE OLYMPIC GAMES

c52. Athens 1896. Winner's Diploma - Presented to Crown Prince Constantine, President of the Organizing Committee. Copper engraving, $60 \times 48 \mathrm{~cm}(23.6 " x 1.9$ "), designed by Nikolaos Gyzis. At the top is the Parthenon with the Greek flag, phoenix rising above. Winged victory at right extending an olive branch, Hellas seated at left, relief of the ancient Olympic Games in center, 5-line Greek legend with space for award legend below. Handwritten 7-line Greek dedication in ink below to Crown Prince Constantine by Thimoleon Philimon, General Secretary of the Organizing Committee. This diploma is pictured in "Olympische Siege" (Olympic Victories, translated from German) by Lennartz, Borgers and Höfer, printed in 2000, on page 13. Lt. foxing, a few water stains and a small tear at left on white border, not extending into design. VF+, framed and glazed. It is dated "B" for Second (Olympic Games in Athens). Signed by Crown Prince Constantine and General Secretary Thimoleon Philimon. Victory with wreath between Hellas and Britannia, athlete seated on r., winner's medal below, athletes on sides. Signed by Lord Desborough, President of the British Olympic Council. The Merit diploma was presented to outstanding athletes who did not win a medal, also officials, federations, etc. Unawarded, in wooden frame, glazed. VF, browning, sm. marginal tears.
