- Second National Greek Olympic Games, Athens 1870. Silver Class A Winner's Medal. Silver, 40mm, by Barre, struck at Paris Mint. Head r. of King George I. Rev. 5-line Greek award legend in open laurel wreath. Polished VF-EF, sm. nicks and rim nicks. Very rare. (\$3,000)
- 4. Third National Greek Olympic Games, Athens 1875. Silver Class B Winner's Medal in Presentation Case. Silver, 40mm, by Barre. Head r. of King George. Rev. "Olympia in Athens 1875" surrounded by "Consecrator of Games Evangelis Zappas" (translated from Greek) and open olive wreath. Housed in extremely rare brown leather presentation case with gold Greek legend "Olympic Games", VF-EF. Medal EF. (\$4,000)
- 5. St. Louis 1904. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Standing High Jump to African-American Joseph F. Stadler. Silver, 40mm, made by Dieges & Clust, New York. Victorious athlete with wreath, Acropolis and ancient Greek athletes in background, "OLYMPIAD 1904". Rev. Victory holding wreath over engraved "400 Meter/Hurdle", bust of Zeus at l. Complete with ribbon suspended from silver bar inscribed "1904/ Universal Exposition/Olympic Games/St. Louis". According to David Wallechinsky, Stadler was the first African American athlete to win an Olympic medal in a field event. He was a member of the Franklin Athletic Club in Cleveland, Ohio. On the same day, August 31, 1904, another African American athlete, George Poage, won Bronze in the 400-Meter Hurdles. The medal is housed in its leather presentation case with gold inscription on the top, lined in black silk. Light scuffing, inside EF. Medal EF. A very rare and important medal. (\$50,000)
- 6. Athens 1906. Silver First Place Winner's Medal for Teams. Silverplated, 30mm. Nike, Goddess of Victory, seated on panel inscribed "Olympia". Rev. 6-line Greek legend in open laurel wreath. *The first place team received a silver medal, the second place team a bronze medal.* With loop and ring. EF. Scarce. (\$4,000)



- 7. London 1908. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal for Men's 400 Meters. Bronze, 34mm, by Bertram MacKennal. Victorious athlete being crowned by two seated females. Rev. St. George slaying the dragon. Edge inscribed "400 Metres Flat". "Few events in Olympic history have caused as much controversy as the final of the 1908 400 meters in London". (David Wollechimsky, Summer Olympics). W. Halswelle, GB, was the favorite, and 3 Americans joined him in the finals, Taylor, Robbins and Carpenter. Carpenter was in lead, and kept Halswelle from passing. The event was rescheduled again two days later but only Halswelle ran, the Americans refused. The result was that only gold was awarded, not silver and bronze. This is the bronze medal inscribed before the Games, and would have been awarded to an American. A medal with a story!. Toned EF. (\$6,000)
- 8. First Russian Olympiad in Kiev, 1913. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 53mm, by Joseph Marshak. Nude discus thrower, view of Kiev in background. Rev. City shield, crossed oak and olive branch below. Russia participated the first time in Olympic Games in Stockholm 1912. The Russian team came in second to last of 18 participating nations. Grand Duke Dmitrii Pavlovich oversaw the Russian Olympic Games in order to train athletes for better results in the next Olympic Games in Berlin 1916. The Sports Ground for the Games was the first permanent stadium in Russia. The "Cartier of Kiev", Joseph Marshak, main competitor of Karl Fabergé, created the winner's medal for the First Russian Olympic Games. See Bubka, Sergey and Bulatova, M.M. "Kiev The First Russian Olympiad 1913", with much information and many photos. EF. Extremely rare. (\$6,500)

- Antwerp 1920. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 60mm, by Dupon. Nude victorious athlete with palm branch and laurel wreath, fame blowing horn. Rev. View of Antwerp. Polished EF. (\$7,500)
- 10. Antwerp 1920. Autographed Photo of the Greek Team. Black and white, 41.8x24.7cm (16.5"x9.7"). The Greek team included 14 athletes, 2 officials, and team leader Chrysafis. Dedicated to the Hellenic Olympic Committee and signed by all 17 Greek team members and officials. EF. (\$1,700)
- 11. Paris 1924. The Sèvres Porcelain Olympic Gold Medal Winner's Vase Awarded for Fencing, Equestrian, Lacrosse and Gymnastics. 33.3cm (13.1") high, designed by talented artist M.O. Guillonet and executed by Bracquemond at the world famous porcelain factory of Sèvres. Golden laurel branches are handpainted on French blue background, the medallions depicting Fencing, Equestrian, Lacrosse and Gymnastics on gray background with green border. Official report p. 804. *The vases were made in several versions to accommodate all Olympic events.* EF. Very rare and beautiful. (\$17,500)
- Lake Placid 1932 Winter. Participation Medal. Bronze, 40x60mm, by Julio Kilenyi. Winged figure of Fame blowing horn, Olympic rings above, winter landscape in background. Rev. Six winter sports depicted on shields around legend in six lines, scenes of curling and dogsledding below. Obv. uneven toning, EF. (\$8,750)

- Los Angeles 1932. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver, 55mm, by Cassioli. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant team members. Dark toning, EF. (\$7,500)
- 32nd IOC Session in Athens 1934. Official Badge. Goldplated, 28x42mm, made by Huguenin. Goddess in center surrounded by 40th anniversary legend of the restoration of the Olympic Games, color Olympic rings and "Athens 1934" below. EF. Rare. (\$2,000)
- 15. Second Soccer World Cup in Rome, 1934. Silver Winner's Medal Awarded to a Member of the Czech Team. Silver, 22x35mm. winged Nike on two hemispheres "F.I.F.A." above. Rev. Fasces in oak wreath, "WORLD'S CUP ROMA GIUGNO 1934". Italy played Czechoslovakia and won after extra-time 2-1. Czech players were Planicka, Ctyroki, Zenisek, Krcil, Cambal, Kostalek, Puc Nejedly, Svoboda, Junek and Sobotka. EF. (\$8,000)

- Garmicsch-Partenkirchen 1936 Winter. Silver Second Place 16. Winner's Medal Awarded to Gustav Lautschner, Germany, for Alpine Skiing. Silver, "999" hallmark, 10cm (3.9"), 326.8 grams, (abt. 10.5oz), by Richard Klein, struck by Deschler, Munich. Victory holding laurel wreath riding in triga to left, bobsled, ski, hockey stick and skate below. Rev. Large Olympic rings surrounded by "IV Olympic Winter Games 1936" (translated from German). Largest size Olympic winner's medal, and one of only 36 medals. Housed in green leatherette case, silver rings on top; scuffed, lined in white silk and ivory velvet. Gustav Lantschner starred in a number of mountain and Olympic films in the 1930's ("The White Intoxication", 1931, with Leni Riefenstahl, and in 1938/39 in two films by Leni Riefenstahl, etc.). In 1936 Berlin he was a cameraman on Riefenstahl's Olympic film. It is very rare to know that the recipient on Garmisch-Partenkirchen winner's medals. The silver winners medals seem to be the rarest to be found. Medal toned Unc. (\$37,500)
- 17. Berlin 1936. Glider Team Leader's Badge. Bronze, 41x46mm. With ochre ribbon, inscribed. Elbel S-105.Only seven nations (Italy, Austria, Switzerland, Hungary, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia and Germany participated with teams and seven team leaders in the Glider Competition (Official report, p. 1100). In case, lined in blue velvet and white silk. EF. Extremely rare. (\$2,500)
- 18. Berlin 1936. Gold Medal Winner's Ceramic Pot for the Oak Tree Sapling to be Planted in the Winner's Home Country. Orange colored, 11cm high, 10cm (3.9") wide at top. decorated by hand with engraved design: German Reich eagle holding Olympic rings dividing "XI. Olympiade Berlin 1936". Legend around top "Wachse zur Ehre des Siegs. Rufe zu weiterer Tat". Translated: "Grow in Honor of the Victory Call for further Accomplishment". Bottom of saucer engraved "Douglas Hill W.V. Campenhausen" (maker). Every gold medal winner in a single event received an oak tree sapling with his gold medal at the award ceremony. According to J. Constandt, of 130 awarded saplings, 16 are known to still survive while 97 could not be verified. EF. Rare. (\$2,500)

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19. Berlin 1936 – Kiel Olympic Sailing Games. Large Sailing Gold Medal Winner's Ceramic Pot Presented with an Oak Tree Seedling at the Kiel 1936 Sailing Events. Brown and inside creamcolored ceramic, 18.5cm (7.3") high, 13.5cm (5.3") wide at top, made by K.K.K. Kiel Laboe landmark and Sailing Boat with large Olympic rings on top, "XI. Segel=Olympiade Kiel MCMXXXVI" (XI. Sailing Olymiad Kiel 1936, translated) written around top, Greek ornament border around bottom. The previous lot shows the oak sapling container that was presented to gold medal winners in Berlin. The Kiel container had not been seen before. EF. Extremely rare. (\$3,500)

- Sapporo 1940 Winter (Cancelled). Official Badge. Silver, multicolor enamel, 35mm. White Mount Fuji against luminescent blue sky, Olympic rings in color and "1940" below, encircled by "Sapporo Vth of Olympic Winter Games". With plum color silk rosette, 61mm. Housed in original balsa wood box, lined in gray velvet, inscribed on top in gold. EF. Extremely rare. (\$15,000)
- 21. Tokyo 1940 (Cancelled). Official Badge of the "Amateur Athletic Federation of Japan". Multicolor enamel, 30mm, on lavender silk (color ltly. faded) rosette, 65mm. Mount Fuji with color Olympic rings, "XII Olympiad/Tokyo 1940" below. In original wooden box lined with yellow velvet, AA Federation legend in gold on top. EF. (\$5,500)

All were filled with Edelweiss flowers. EF. (\$2,000)

- Mexico City 1968. Commemorative Gold Guadalajara Medal, Venue of Preliminary Football Events. Gold, 40mm, 41.6 grams, 21.7 Karat. Arms of Guadalajara over Olympic legend. Rev. "Jalisco" (State) within a circle of Aztec symbols. (\$1,650)
- Mexico City 1968. Fuel Container for the Mexico City 1968 Torches. Multicolor cardboard and iron, 13.7cm (5.4") high, 5.7cm (2.2") wide. "Antorcha Olimpica – Combustible Solido" legend, on top dove pictogram and "Peace" in three languages. Lt. stains, VF-EF. Rare. (\$150)

31. Soccer World Cup in England, 1966. Bronze Winner's Medal Awarded to a Member of the Portuguese Team. Bronze, 22x35mm. Winged Nike on two hemispheres, "F.I.F.A." above. Rev. Open oak wreath dividing "World Championship Jules Rimet Cup" and "In England 1966". Portugal beat the Soviet Union for the third place, England (first) beat West Germany (second). EF. (\$4,000)

32. Soccer World Cup in Mexico, 1970. Silver Winner's Medal Awarded to a Member of the Italian Team. Sterling silver hallmark, 22x35mm. Winged Nike on two hemispheres, "F.I.F.A." above. Rev. Open oak wreath dividing "Campeonato Mundial de Futbal – Copa Jules Rimet" and "Mexico 1970". Brazil beat the Italian team for second place, while West Germany was third beating Uruguay. Abt. EF. (\$6,500)

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- 33. Los Angeles 1984. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for 4x400 Meter Relay Men to Ulo Rotimi Peters from Nigeria. Bronze, 60mm, by Dugald Stermer. Victory seated above stadium. Rev. Winner carried by jubilant teammates. Edge inscribed with event. With 12 photos, two showing Peters in Los Angeles 1984 with his medal; various events he participated in, his family etc. Pasted on board or removed from album, VF to EF. With tricolor ribbon. EF. (\$9,000)
- 34. Albertville 1992 Winter. Official Torch for the Lighting of the Olympic Flame in Olympia, Greece. Wood, partially blackened, 53cm (21"). The torch used was a Mexico 1968 torch embellished with decorative brass around top and bottom. Photos that show the torch in Olympia are included in this lot. *From Berlin 1936 through Albertville 1992* the flame was lit with a torch from the Olympic city where the Games were to be held. From Barcelona 1992 on the same torch made of silver has been used for the lighting ceremony. EF (torch and photos). Unique. (\$18,000)
- 5. Albertville 1992 Winter. Silver Second Place Winner's Medal. Silver and Lalique crystal glass, 92mm, 9mm thick. The crystal shows large Olympic rings over Alpine mountains, set in a silver border which is engraved with logo and olive branch, Albertville 92 legend at bottom. No sport was engraved on the Albertville 1992 medals although an IOC direction asked for it. With silver ribbon, Olympic color stripes in center. *The medals were entirely handmade in* 35 different processes. Housed in gray leatherette case lined in gray velvet, logo on top, a few spots on box. Medal Unc. A beautiful and very rare medal. (\$40,000)
- 36. Lillehammer 1994 Winter. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Awarded for Four-Man Bobsleigh. Bronze and Norwegian granite sparagmite stone, 80mm, 78mm, by Ingierd Hanevold. Olympic rings and stylized ice crystal frame attached to sparagmite stone. Rev. Four-Man Bobsleigh over ice crystals and logo, "Bobsleigh" at top engraved in stone, "Four-Man Bobsleigh" engraved in lower right. With blue and purple ribbon, housed in round blackened wood box with clear plastic top. EF. Rare. (\$25,000)



- 37. Sydney 2000. Ceramic Bowl ("Likythos") as Used in the Lighting of the Flame Ceremony in Olympia for the Sydney Torch Relay. Black ceramic with red-brown design, 15.5cm (6.1") wide, 12.2cm (4.8") high, made by Ioulia Karagrouna. Seated lyre student and teacher, playing, music, and Athena with shield and helmet, divided by laurel branches. Signed and dated May 10, 2000 on bottom. One of only four bowls. Unused. EF (bowl and two photos). (\$7,200)
- 38. Torino 2006 Winter. Ceramic Bowl ("Likythos") as Used in the Lighting of the Flame Ceremony in Olympia on November 27, 2005 for the Torino Torch Relay. Black ceramic with redbrown design, 15.5cm (6.1") wide, 12.2cm (4.8") high, made by V. Sisterli. Three ancient Greek runners and a single runner divided by ancient Greek designs. Inscribed on bottom "Olympic Torch Lighting" (in Greek) "November 27, 2005", and "Torino 2006". Plus two photos of the torch lighting ceremony. One of only four bowls. Unused. EF (bowl and three photos). (\$7,200)
- **Beijing 2008. Official Torch Relay Lantern to Store the Olympic Flame during the Torch Relay.** Silver and red, 31 cm (12.2") high, 9x9 cm (3.5 x 3.5") wide. Lucky red clouds on all 4 sides, of the mother flame safety lamp, surrounding the logo on the front, and lucky silver clouds adorn the lower part. The design was inspired by the lanterns used in ancient Chinese palaces. With igniter and key. Housed in a large wooden box. EF. Rare. (**\$9,750**)
- Delightful Group of Four Bronze Sculptures Featuring Children Playing Baseball, Basketball, American Football and Golf. - 44. Berlin 1936. Official Torch. Steel, 27cm high (10.5"), made by Krupp Factory, designed by Carl Diem. Route of torch run from Olympia to Berlin on shaft, legend on top. *Carried during the first Olympic torch relay from Olympia, Greece to Berlin, a distance of 3075 km in 12 days.* EF. (**\$6,500**)
- London 1948. Official Torch. Aluminum alloy, 47cm (18.5"). Cut-out Olympic rings over "XIVth Olympiad 1948. Olympia to London With Thanks to the Bearer". EF. (\$9,750)
- 46. Melbourne 1956. Official Torch. Aluminum alloy, 47cm (18.5") tall. Cut-out Olympic rings dividing legend "Melbourne XVI OLYMPIAD 1956". 110 torch runners carried the flame from Darwin to Melbourne after Qantas Airline brought the flame from Athens. EF. (\$19,000)
- 47. Rome 1960. Official Torch in its Container. Bronzed aluminum, 39.5cm (15.5"). Designed by Professor Maiure and his team from the National Museum of Archeology in Naples. The design is based on drawings of torches on ancient Etruscan ceramics. Housed in its protective container, lt. wear, with original plastic torch wrap and official wax flame at the top. EF. (\$9,500)



- Mexico City 1968. Official White Metal Torch. Cast white metal, 45cm (17.7"). "Mexico" and logo around top. *This torch was used in the torch relay in Mexico*. EF. (\$3,250)
- 49. **Mexico City 1968. Official Black Torch.** Black painted aluminum, part of shaft made of wood, 52.8cm (20.9"). Silver colored doves around top. *The black torch was used in the torch relay from Olympia to Athens, Greece.* Lt. wear, VF-EF. (**\$2,500**)
- 50. **Munich 1972. Official Torch.** Steel, 73cm (28.8"), made by Krupp. *The fire was lit in Olympia, Greece on July 28 and carried 5539 km in 29 days to Munich by 5976 runners.* EF. (**\$2,500**)
- 51. Montreal 1976. Official Gold Presentation Torch for High Dignitaries. Goldplated, 65.9cm (25.9") tall. Montreal 1976 logo on handle. Only a very small number of gold torches was made for presentation to very high dignitaries. EF, in black velvet pouch. Very rare. (\$18,500)
- 52. Moscow 1980. Official Torch Used in the Torch Relay. Aluminum alloy, gray and gold, Moscow logo and legend in red, 56cm (22-1/2") high, designed by Boris Tuchin. Runners carried the torch during the 30-day torch relay from Olympia, Greece through Bulgaria and Romania to Moscow, a distance of 4976 km. Lt. wear, abt. EF. (\$3,000)
- Barcelona 1992. Official Torch. Chrome-plated aluminum, 65cm (23.6"), designed by André Rich. "XXV Olympiad Barcelona 1992" legend and goldplated Barcelona emblem. Rubbing on leather part as usual, o.w. EF. (\$5,000)
- 54. Atlanta 1996. Official Torch. Aluminum and Georgia pecan wood, 80cm (31.5"), designed by Peter Mastrogiannis. 22 reeds represent the cities where Olympic Games were held since 1896. Gathered by 2 goldplated brass bands, the top band displays the Atlanta torch logo and the quilt of leaves design, the bottom band lists all Olympic cities since 1896. It reached Los Angeles on April 27 and ended 84 days later in Atlanta, carried by 10,000 relay runners, horses, bicycles, trains, ships, and hydroplanes.* Abt. EF. (\$2,500)

It left Greece on December 8 on the Concorde to visit about 70 countries and islands worldwide, to arrive in Paris on December 14. 5,500 torchbearers carried the flame 5,536 km (3,440 miles) around France to Albertville where the cauldron was lit at the opening ceremony on February 8, 1992, by Michel Platini and Francoise-Cyrille Grange, a Savoyard girl. One of only 100 torches (numbered 18) and very difficult to find. EF. (\$75,000)
- 62. **Nagano 1998 Winter. Official Torch.** Aluminum, partially gilt, 55cm (21.7") long. Designed after ancient Japanese torches called Taimatsu. It ended at the opening ceremony on February 7, 2014, in Sochi. EF. (\$4,500)*
