

- 51. (Brochure) Police Du Stade The Stadium Police. Regulation of the Order Service at the Panathenaic Stadium During the Olympic International Games, Athens 1896. 14 pages, 14.2x20.1cm (5.6"x7.9"), in French. Two fold-out pages tipped in at the end, in Greek, French and German showing the topographical diagram of the stadium and surroundings, and the stadium itself with zones, seats etc. Dated March 8, 1896 by N.C. Metaxas, chief general commander, and superintendent of the Olympic Games. The document was approved by the Crown Prince being the President of the Games. All security regulations for the stadium and all other Olympic venues are explained in detail. Front cover stained, contents clean, EF. Very rare. (\$2,000)
- 52. (Program) Opening Ceremony of the First Olympic Games, Monday, April 6, 1896 at 15.00h, and Athletic Sports, Starting at 15.30h (3:30 pm) at the Olympic Stadium. 7 pages, 16x23cm (6.3"x9.1"), in Greek and French. The program of the Olympic Games opens at 3 pm, following by 100M at 3:30 pm which were won by Thomas Burke, Boston Athletic Association, USA. Fritz Hofmann, Germany, placed second. Triple Jump at 3:40 pm were won by James Connolly, Suffolk Athletic Club, USA, followed by 800 Meters at 4:15 pm won by Edwin Flack, Australia. Finally Discus at 4:25 pm was won by Robert Garrett, Princeton, USA. Lt. browning, lt. center crease, EF. (\$1,000)
- 53. **Program of the Nautical Olympic International Sports** (Rowing), 1896. 4 pages, 15.6x23.5cm (6.1"x9.3"), in Greek and French. Members of the Jury, program of the races and names of participants. In case of bad weather the event would be held the following day, decree by Prince George, April 1, 1896. Published by the Olympic Committee and printed by N.G. Igglesi, Athens. Browning, sides chipped on second page, VF. Very rare. (\$800)
- 54. Official Results Names of Winners. 7 stiff pages, 15.7x22.8cm (6.2"x9") in Greek, cover in Greek and French, by the Olympic Committee, printed by P.D. Sakellariou Presses, Athens. All events, all winners are included. Cover discolored at top, trace of writing, contents EF. Rare. (\$800)
- 55. Connolly, James B. An Olympic Victor. New York, 1908. 186 pages, 8 plates, 13.7x20.3cm (5.4"x8"). The winner of the Triple Jump on Opening Day tells the story of Spiridon Louis winning the marathon. Red linen covers very stained, contents VF-EF. (\$100)
- 56. Spyridis, G. Le Panorama Illustré Des Jeux Olympiques. The Illustrated Panorama of the Olympic Games. Historical Study Accompanied by Several Engravings and a Map of Olympia, Together with the Program of the Olympic Games of 1896. Dedicated to Mr. Averoff, Athens 1894. 78 pages, illustrated, 15.8x25cm (6.2"x9.8"), rebound in brown linen with both covers and new end papers. Lt. browning, back cover stained, contents EF. (\$240)



PARIS, 2nd OLYMPIC GAMES, 1900

The 1900 Paris Olympic Games were held in conjunction with the World's Exposition. They played only a minor role. There were athletes who didn't know that the events they participated in were Olympic Games events. Few items relate directly to the Games. For this reason we are also offering items commemorating the World Exposition.


- 57. Silver Shooting Winner's Plaque Silvered bronze, 41x59mm, by F. Vernon. Winged goddess scattering laurel branches over Paris exposition grounds. Rev. Victorious athlete standing on podium inscribed "CONCOURS DE TIR/VII CONCOURS/NATIONAL". Toned EF. (\$800)
- Bronze Award Plaque for Physical Education by the Sports Minister. Bronze, 41x59mm, by F. Vernon. Victorious athlete standing on podium. Rev. 4-line French award legend over laurel branch. Cased, plaque toned EF/VF-EF. (\$700)
- 59. International Olympic Gymnastics Bronze Winner's Medal. Bronze, 48mm. Gymnastic equipment, laurel wreath above. Rev. "Concours International de Gymnastique 1900" over laurel and oak branch. *International competitions were Olympic events in Paris 1900*. Loop and ring at top, toned EF. (\$400)
- 60. **Bronze Award Medal of the Paris 1900 World's Exposition.** Bronze, 61mm, by Chaplain. Head of French Republic r. Rev. Male with torch carried by Victory. *Since no participation medals were made in 1900, collectors like to add this medal to their collection.* EF. (\$150)
- 61. **Jury's Badge.** Silver, 23x40mm designed by L.A. Bottée, made by Christofle & Cie, Paris. Seated Fame with palm branch and horn, "Jury" below. Elbel S-2. Toned EF. (**\$500**)

63. Exhibition Paris 1900 Catalog. 431 pages with numerous maps and illustrations, plus many advertisements, 12.4x18.7cm (4.9"x7.4"), in English. Olympic Games events from May to October are mentioned in pages 1-19; Plus "Sport at the Exhibition", pages 430-432 with program and dates for all Olympic events. Very large fold-out map of Paris with event location, tipped in. Most detailed Paris guide. Covers detached, contents browning, EF. (\$200)

ST. LOUIS, 3rd OLYMPIC GAMES, 1904

The 1904 Olympic Games in St. Louis were also held in conjunction with a World's Fair. This, again, detracted a lot from the importance of the Games. Few items are available that relate directly to the Olympiad, and they usually command very high prices. For this reason, we are also offering some memorabilia from the World's Fair which celebrated the Centennial of the Louisiana Purchase from Napoleon in 1803.

64. Participation Medal. Bronze, 40x40mm, made by Dieges & Clust, New York. Nude athlete striding r., laurel branch in hand. Rev. Legend in eleven lines, shields of St. Louis, France and U.S.A. between ivy leaves. "E.C. Brown" engraved on bottom edge. Everett C. Brown (1863-1937) was a member of the American Olympic Committee, and he had been a member of the Chicago Olympic Planning Committee (the 1904 Games were first awarded to Chicago). He also was a timer in St. Louis during the Olympic Games Week when he would have worn this badge. As a member of the Executive Committee of the AOC he was in charge of American teams for London 1908, Stockholm 1912, Antwerp 1920, and Paris 1924. He was also President of the National AA Union in 1910. With loop and ring. Toned on reverse, EF. (\$13,000)



- 65. Silver Winner's Medal Awarded for 56-lb Weight Throw to J.E. Landon, June 3, 1904, at the Western Intercollegiate Championships. Silver, 31x37mm, made by Mermod & Jaccard. AAU logo above legend. Rev. "56 Lt. Weight/J.E. Landon" engraved in 2 lines. Suspended from bar with "1904/Universal Exposition/Olympic Games/St. Louis". The medal is pictured in Jim Greensfelder's a.o. brochure "1904 Olympic Games", and in G. Mathews and S. Marshall's "St. Louis Olympics 1904". Toned EF. (\$3,000)
- 66. Olympic National Regatta on Creve Coeur Lake Pin. Triangular red and blue flag, 35x22mm. "NAAO" (National Association of Amateur Oarsmen) on blue. Rev. 4-line legend "Olympic/National Regatta-Creve Coeur Lake / St. Louis, Mo. / July 29-30, 1904". Pin bent, flag EF. Very rare. (\$400)
- 67. Arts and Science International Conference Badge. Silvered, 39x39mm. Bust of Peace facing between exposition legend, sun rising in back, surrounded by scrolls. Suspended from "Arts and Science" bar, and four-color ribbon inscribed "International Conference" (very faint). Badge VF-EF. (\$1,000)
- 68. Universal Congress of Lawyers and Jurists Badge. Silvered copper, 39x39mm. Bust of Peace facing between exposition legend, sun rising in back surrounded by scrolls. Suspended from "Universal Congress of Lawyers and Jurists" bar and dark red silk ribbon. EF. (\$1,000)

- Official French Award Plaque for the St. Louis 1904 Exposition. Bronze, 61x73mm, by Bottée. French Republique seated in boat showing Progress the St. Louis exposition site. Rev. Legend beside tree. Toned EF. (\$150)
- Official Souvenir Medal. Silver, 34mm. Joint busts l. of Napoleon and Jefferson who negotiated the 1803 sale of land. Rev. Map of the United States with addition of Louisiana Territory Purchase in 1803. EF. (\$100)
- 71. Preliminary Program of Physical Culture Olympic Games and World's Championship Contests. St. Louis. 51 pages, 1 photographic plate, 15.3x22.2cm (6"x8.7"). Complete schedule of all sporting events, May 14 – November 24, 1904. Members of the IOC, all Olympic Committees, Regulations, Program of Olympic Games, August 29 – September 3 followed by program of all other Olympic and non-Olympic events, May 14 – November 24. Stiff covers, lt. soiling, contents EF. Rare. (\$800)
- 72. Official Entry Blank for the 1904 Olympic Games. Two pages, 21.6x35.2cm (8.5"x13.9"). List of all U.S. leaders, the IOC with Coubertin as President, and a list of all IOC members as well as members of the American Committee. Rev. The Official Entry Blank, unused. Taped twice, VF, but extremely rare. (\$700)

Hahn wins 200M; H Hillman wins 400M Hurdles; Ray Ewry wins Standing High Jump, and R. Rose wins Shot Put. Tickets of the Athletic Olympic Games are rarely seen. EF. (\$500)

Blue linen gilt, 96 pages, 29x39cm (11.4"x15.4"). 120 handwritten comments written for the Germans in America. With Olympic connection V. Podbielski and Th. Lewald are included. EF. (\$100)

- 75. Bronze Third Place Winner's Medal Housed in its Presentation Box. Bronze, 50mm by J. Chaplain. Laureated head of Zeus facing holding winged statue of Victory with laurel branch on globe. Rev. View of Acropolis and Parthenon between Olympic legend. Housed in round red box lined in velvet. Toned EF. (\$5,000)
- 76. American Olympic Committee Official's Badge. Goldplated copper, 29x36mm. American eagle with outstretched wings displaying Greek and American shield, AAU logo between oak and olive branch below, "Olympic Games 1906" at top. Rev. "Compliments of Jas. E. Sullivan Sec'y (Secretary) American Olympic Committee". *First U.S. American Olympic badge*. EF. (\$1,200)

77. Member of the Reception Committee Badge. Celluloid, 31mm. Laureated head left of Zeus, "Olympic Games/1906/The Reception Committee" (translated from Greek). *The Hellenic Committee organized a reception for the foreign athletes at the Zappeion*. Rare. EF. (\$600)

- 78. Commemorative Badge of the Athens 1906 Games. Celluloid, 38mm, with black and green design. View of the stadium in open laurel wreath, 2 Greek flags, and "1906" in center. Greek legend translated "Souvenir of the International Olympic Games taking place in Athens, 1906". EF. Scarce. (\$500)
- 79. Rules and Regulations Part 1: Athletic Sports, Gymnastics, Fencing, Football and Lawn Tennis. Athens 1905. 70 pages, 14x20.5cm (5.5"x8.1'), in French. Includes also the addresses of all 21 foreign representatives. Trace of crease lower right, light foxing on covers, contents EF. Rare. (\$900)
